Doddington and Rollo Community Association, a charitable company was established in 1983 to promote opportunities for education training, and employment and to provide in those areas facilities for recreation and community activities.

During this time, it has moved from being substantially grant-aided to be financially self-sufficient for day-to-day running costs thus ensuring that the DRCA can plan ahead without the uncertainty of funding cuts threatening its future.

CHAIRS REPORT

The DRCA is not unique as a Co-Operative business centre in London but it is increasingly rare. The affordable rents unit holders enjoy, the peppercorn rents charities pay for their premises, and the very affordable community halls lent out to local groups, are incredibly special in the midst of a property market which inflates ever more prohibitively. But, like all precious resources in a voracious world, the DRCA needs respecting and protecting. When I stood for election as new Chairman in August 2022 I did so with the belief that the DRCA is a Co-Operative organisation which should continue to be run as collectively as possible to the benefit of as many people as possible, I would like to use this opportunity to encourage everyone who benefits from the place to help run the place. To come along to AGM's and take part if you can. In that capacity I'd like to thank Daria Hass for standing in as chairman after long time DRCA stalwart and Chairman, Brian Barnes, passed away last year. Daria navigated her 6 months in the post with committed diligence. We are in the process of finalising a plaque to memorialise Brian Barnes' long involvement with the DRCA which will ultimately reside on the wall near the front entrance. There will be an unveiling ceremony later on this year which we'd encourage all to attend. It's widely acknowledged that the DRCA would no longer be here today if the notoriously stubborn Brian Barnes hadn't fought tooth and nail to ensure its survival at various precarious points in its decades of history.

Over the last few years COVID has thrown up numerous convoluted logistics for the DRCA, which Im pleased to report we've managed to navigate without too much collateral damage. Dealing with the situation did however force us to dip into our financial reserves and we are now in the process of slowly rebuilding those reserves.

Despite taxing circumstances for many, none of the businesses which operate within the DRCA's four walls collapsed during or after the COVID lockdowns. Including of course the DRCA itself whose community facilities were unrentable during all the lockdowns.

A big thanks is owed to DRCA CEO Justin O'Kello for helping lots of organisations within the DRCA understand local authority help available to aid their survival, as well as securing grants for the DRCA itself. Justin was also successful in negotiating an energy contract for the DRCA just prior to the recent massive increase in energy prices, which has locked us into to relatively low-priced electricity for the next few years.

A big thank you must also go to Nadeene Morris who stepped into the role as full time administrator following the departure of Sonia last year. Nadeene has got her feet well and truly under the table with an energetic enthusiasm for all that the DRCA does and aspires to do. Big thanks also to Sonia Brown for nigh on 25 years of service as DRCA administrator and outreach worker. Improvements within the building over the last year have seen all the corridor walls and floors newly painted. And we owe a debt of gratitude to the charity GoodGym.org - whose voluntary members do physical work for communal causes as a means of exercise - for their massive help in giving the DRCA a fresh face.

And whilst we're on the subject of thanking helpful volunteers, a shout must also goes out to John Mendoza who continues to lend his grasp of administrative processes to help DRCA with numerous jobs involving Excel spreadsheets. And all he ever asks for in return? A cup of tea whilst he plugs in the data.

Over the last year the DRCA's corridors have also been deep cleaned, and new a Paladin and storage unit has been built at the back. Even though 'Paladin' sounds like it could possibly be a bejewelled carriage from the Arabian Nights fables, it is in fact a fancy word for a bin store. The big dustbin and recycling bins at the back are now tucked away out of sight in the new Paladin, and the newly built storage unit next to it is now rented out to the benefit of the DRCA.

Other new additions also include a communal table upstairs which stands on a stretch of astro turf and is surrounded by numerous indoor plants purloined at the end of the Wimbledon Tennis Tournament. A new media room - with tables chairs and internet access - was also completed this year on the site of the old café upstairs and is now a rentable resource.

The DRCA is now the guardian custodian of a new 'Community Cargo Bike' installed in the pedestrian area out the front of the DRCA by Wandsworth Council. It is available to borrow FOR FREE for the first 2 hours to do your shopping or transport heavy stuff from A to B.

Thanks for reading this far. Looking forward then to a brighter more industrious year coming up for the DRCA, with no more COVID lockdowns and a greater fostering of community in and around the place. Do please come and take part if you feel able.
